Letter from the Chancellor

Greetings,

I hope this message finds you well. It is evident that COVID-19 continues to deeply impact all aspects of life. As we adjust in the face of this health crisis, I am heartened by the many ways the UMSL and St. Louis communities have come together to support each other.

Since many of our students are our neighbors, I want to share with you a few ways we are working to support their educational success. We launched the <u>Triton Emergency</u> <u>Assistance Fund</u> to help students meet urgent financial needs, whether they be rent or utility payments or help with transportation. We have assisted UMSL students with securing more than \$42,000 in emergency grants and scholarships over the last few weeks. We've continued to provide student workers who could not work remotely with paid administrative leave – the same as our regular staff members. This past week, we also made the decision to move all summer courses to 100 percent online and we've waived all online supplemental course fees for the summer to help them continue their academic progress.

Our mission to serve both in and outside the classroom remains strong. UMSL's health and counseling services have shifted to telehealth, the Child Advocacy Center produced a webinar on supporting children through uncertain times, and our pre-collegiate services have switched to online offerings. The federal government recently passed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, which includes substantial funding for small businesses (for-profit, nonprofit, and religious). If you are a small business, nonprofit, or religious institution with fewer than 500 employees, you may be eligible for funds to cover 2.5 months of payroll. 

Federal funds are allocated through the completion of this census to distribute to each state's various programs including student loans, school funding, infrastructure and other important resources. The number of seats that Missouri holds in Congress is also determined by this census.
