UMSL Department of Art and Design collaborates with newly opened Sundance Café to display faculty works

When Breakaway Café, a longtime institution in the Normandy/Bel-Nor neighborhood, closed its doors due to a fire in 2021, Kirk Kirkpatrick made a promise. He told his mother that, if the building was able to be resurrected, he would reopen it as a café again.... He wanted to make sure there would still be a neighborhood place for community members to gather.

Sadly, Kirkpatrick lost his mother just a few months later, in April 2022, but he made good on his promise with the opening of Sundance Café a few weeks ago. Over the course of a year and three months, with the help of the city of Bel-Nor, Kirkpatrick and co-owners Darren Woodford and Jason Cusick brought the much-loved restaurant space back to life....

From the start, the owners envisioned Sundance Café as a community gathering space designed to foster conversation, which is reflected in the space itself. Instead of TVs, the walls are filled with artwork from faculty members in UMSL's Department of Art and Design. Read more.



Ferguson shows resilience 10 years after the shooting of Michael Brown

When Ferguson made national news 10 years ago, there was little positive news to report. The tragic death of 18-year-old Michael Brown Jr. at the hands of former Ferguson police officer Darren Wilson shocked the world and left a stain that some thought might last forever. But the signs of progress are a testament to show how resilient this community was then and now.

The new businesses that have been built are replacing the images of Ferguson as a war zone of protests with the promise of prosperity and progress to come....The National League of cities included downtown Ferguson in a recent tour. The reason they selected Ferguson was to showcase the city's resiliency. "Our City has demonstrated its resilience and commitment to building a thriving, inclusive community," Ferguson Mayor Jones told nlc100. "That is what I hope people will take away from our tour and presentation. We are thrilled to host our esteemed colleagues from the National League of Cities and proud to show off our City." Decade since Ferguson unrest has brought changes for criminal justice system and those who study it

Lee Slocum, a professor of criminology and criminal justice at the University of Missouri–St. Louis, learned about the civil unrest in Ferguson, Missouri, a decade ago while watching international news from across the ocean. At the time, Slocum was on research leave in the Netherlands. From this vantage point, it was a bit surreal to take in images of the protests roiling along West Florissant Avenue, less than four miles from her campus office, in the wake of the killing of teenager Michael Brown by a Ferguson police officer....

She frequently found herself being asked by those around her to share some insight on what was happening. At the moment, she couldn't have known the extent to which those conversations would continue in the years ahead as the U.S. Department of Justice conducted two investigations – one into the circumstances of Brown's death and another into the practices of the Ferguson Police Department.

Those investigations would inspire some significant changes to the criminal justice system and for those like Slocum who study it. With the world recently marking the 10th anniversary of Brown's death, UMSL Daily spoke to Slocum about the legacy of Ferguson in efforts to reform policing and the impact it has had shaping research. County Port Authority loan to anchor A Red Circle Nexus project

The St. Louis County Port Authority has awarded a \$200,000 grant to A Red Circle to finance architectural expenses for its North County Community Nexus project. The initiative includes renovation of an existing 43,000-square-foot strip mall and two-story office building located at 9300 Lewis and Clark Blvd....The Nexus will consolidate A Red Circle's headquarters, a community-owned grocery store, the Learning and Opportunity Center, a bistro, a demonstration garden, and options available for rent including a storage shed with communal farm equipment, cold storage so farmers can
